

Club Meeting Information

October Meeting Summary

The minutes from the brief October meeting can be found at the end of this newsletter.

October Guest Speaker

October saw us all meet at Garden City Helicopters which operates the Westpac Rescue helicopter service, the guys there took us through points pertinent to boat and water rescues. When a helicopter is dispatched to a rescue the crew will consist of the pilot and two paramedics, one of which will also operate the winch if required. After joking that the rescue would depend on the contents of your catch bag, we got down to the things that you can do to minimise the need for calling these guys out, and what to do to assist them or yourself in the event you do:

Preparation before your trip or dive

There are several things to do to help make the trip safe:

- Make sure everyone on the boat knows how to start it and drive it, and how to drop the anchor with a buoy attached.
- Take a camera phone photo of the diver before they go in, and note the entry time and the expected resurfacing time.
- Tell others if you are allergic to certain medicines.
- Have a distress beacon (EPIRB or PLB). The recommendation is that this should be a GPS enabled one – you can read more about the difference between GPS and non-GPS beacons here <http://beacons.amsa.gov.au/gps.html>

Give Clear Details

Emergencies involving water are given a high priority. Make sure you give the operator (dial 111 and ask for police if you have a missing diver or ask for ambulance if you have a medical emergency) the **BEST** information you can about what has happened and where, this could include:

- GPS co-ordinates if you have them – make sure they are relayed correctly.
- Describe the boat or diver in difficulty – colours etc.
- For a missing diver give the time that they went into the water and when you expected them to surface.

What to do to prepare

Once you know the rescue services are on their way, prepare by:

- Drop an anchor with buoy attached to mark the last known location of a missing diver.
- Securing items on the boat that could be blown around by the rotor wash which can be up to 60 knots.
- Activate your EPIRB/PLB – do NOT turn it off once you have activated it or when you hear the chopper arriving, they will still need it on to pin-point your location.
- Rescue services may be in contact with the caller on route to gather more info about weather and sea conditions – it takes about 18-20 mins for the chopper to get to Motunau and about 45 mins to Kaikoura from Christchurch however depending on other emergencies helicopters may be sent from Nelson or Wellington.

Waiting for a Water Rescue

If you are a diver that has surfaced and are in a 'waiting to be rescued situation', the following things can make you easier to spot from a helicopter:

- Bright colours – lay your safety sausage out flat on the water to make it easier to spot from the air.
- Keep in mind that heat-seeking equipment struggles to pick up heat through wetsuits, if you hear the chopper you may need to remove your hood or the like.
- If you have activated your EPIRB/PLB then hold it above the water as far as you can to get the best signal out. They don't work as well on or in the water.

When the helicopter arrives

When the helicopter arrives at the scene, there are several things you will need to do to assist them:

- If you are in the water rough it up so it looks 'different' from the surrounding area.
- Attract attention by waving if you are the boat needing assistance, or point to the place or boat if you are not.
- If a rescuer is to be winched down to your boat, point your boat into the wind and maintain enough speed for steerage.
- If a 'high line' is lowered do **NOT** do either of the following:
 - ✘ Pull on it – it has a 60kg breaking strain.
 - ✘ Attach it to your boat, just put the weighted end into a bin and pile the rope in on top of it.
- If a smoke bomb is dropped do NOT drive your boat or swim towards it.
- If you are winched from the water then keep your arms at your sides and do not reach for the helicopter skids.

Grant thanked the rescue team for their time and presented the speakers with two bottles of wine. The club made a donation to the Air Rescue Trust of \$300.

Members Out and About

Can you sink a Stabi? - by Terry Reilly

Some of you have heard rumours of Terry's recent little misadventure; he tells us what happened...

These photos were taken after the storm last month; the boat was moored at the Bay of Many Coves, Marlborough Sounds. We had planned on a quiet week away to do some scouting round for some good non cod fishing spots for the upcoming Lermontov trip. A beaut spot and a great wee Bach called 'Sunhaven' with a wonderful view of the cove. The 3 days up until then was sunny and calm and felt like we were in the middle of summer.

We were warned by the owner of the bach of the storm arriving so the boat was tied up good and proper to the mooring. The water in the boat was mostly deposited by waterspouts that reached at least 100 meters into the air not far from the boat. Within 1.5 hours the boat was full and being tossed around. It carried on all night and I didn't expect to see it still there in the morning. To our relief it was so I went out to look at the damage. It was full of water, both batteries had shorted out so all the bailing out practice I had done from my sailing dinghy came in very handy.

Once it was empty I left her out in the sun to dry out. It was hard to believe we had just come through a big storm. I was lucky enough to have taken a spare battery from the Prado that I was using for lighting the camp lights (Bach has a generator but wanted some quiet) so used that to try and start the boat hoping I wasn't going to fry anything when I tried it. The Yamaha- 100 4 stroke didn't miss a beat, not like the little motor in my chest on turning the key. One huge smile later we packed up and came home that day. It is now at Mr. Boats being sorted (thank God for insurance) 2 marine batteries , new loom, gps, vhs, fishfinder 2 engines defogged, petrol checked to see if it was contaminated and a few extras I am putting on and she will be as good as new. (Automatic bilge pump for one and worth every penny)

Stabi's unsinkable (TO RIGHT ☺) DO I SOUND LIKE AN AD? Don't care. You won't see me buy any other boat.

Well that's all for now, at the end of the day what's really important is no one was hurt in the storm and we all have our stories to tell, just thought I'd share mine.

Recipe for Crayfish Tomato Soup

This is a recipe that is easy to make and Rod loves to eat, I've simplified it from a recipe by Jamie Oliver.

The spices sound odd but they really work so do try it with them in first. Most supermarkets now sell 'passata' – it's like plain tomato puree and normally comes in a tall glass jar.

Serves 4 (or two greedy people)

Ingredients

2 medium size crays – uncooked is preferable because you are going to be using the shells and bodies as the flavour base for the soup. Works fine with frozen as well as fresh.

Extra Virgin Olive Oil

1 large onion – finely chopped

1 large carrot – finely chopped

6 cloves of garlic – finely chopped

1 cinnamon stick

1 or 2 small dried chillies – crumbled (or use dried chilli flakes)

1 teaspoon fennel seeds – crushed up (or use ground fennel)

½ bottle white wine

1 ½ pints 'passata' or 3 x 400gm tins of crushed tomatoes

Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

First, remove all the flesh from the body and the tails of the crays and cut into bite size chunks and set aside in the fridge. If the crays have decent size legs pull them off and cook them quickly in boiling water and remove the meat and set that aside as well. Break the remaining shells and body parts into slightly smaller pieces.

In a good sized pot, pour in a couple of good lugs of olive oil and throw in the bodies and the shells from the crays (and the legs if they were small and you can't be bothered digging out the meat). Turn up the heat and thrown in the onion, garlic, carrot, cinnamon and spices. Move and fry this mix for about 15 mins making sure it doesn't catch and burn, you want a little colour though. If the pan gets too hot splash a little water into it.

Add the wine and boil hard for 5 mins then add the passata/tomatoes and an equal amount of water. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for about an hour. Strain everything into a colander over another pot or bowl and leave to drain. Then press everything with the back of a ladle or bowl to get all the juice out – I like to use my hands to wring out handfuls and get every last drop of flavour out. Once you have all the liquid out of the shells throw them away and you should be left with a nice bowl/pot of smoothish tomatoey soup. Bring this back to a simmer, drop in your raw cray meat and cook for a few mins until just cooked through. Season to taste.

Serving – the original recipe said to add cooked pasta shapes to the soup at the end, but I rather prefer to serve with good crusty bread, or garlic bread – both to dunk into the soup. You can sprinkle torn basil leaves over the finished soup if you have them, and drizzle with more extra virgin olive oil if you like.

The Canterbury Underwater Club Lodge offers a fantastic facility to both members and non-members with dedicated boat parking, gear washing facilities, fish filleting stations, crayfish cooker and a communal cooking and living area.

The lodge can sleep a maximum of 20 people in its' five rooms, specific rooms can be requested when booking but may change to accommodate the numbers of person in a party.

The Annex rooms (11 to 16) can sleep up to 16 people and will be reserved for members only unless the entire Lodge has been pre-booked for a Group.

This will not apply to holiday weekends and may be varied for either of the above if the lodge is only or likely to be partially occupied during your stay.
